From the Desk of the SACPCMP Registrar

As we move towards the middle of another calendar year, I am pleased to see that two key focus points of the SACPCMP are taking shape.

The first being a sharper focus on addressing the Council's 13 mandate areas - this is important for a number of key reasons.

Council Foundations

Firstly, our mandates define us as a regulator and guide us in serving the public effectively. The mandates form the foundation of the Council's existence and align the organisation to the 'bigger picture' of a functioning and sustainable Built Environment. In addition, the mandates provide a checklist for the Council's to work towards. This assists us in ensuring that each and every action emanating from the Council is meaningful and targeted in achieving goals that will support, serve and protect the public.

Unethical or Illegal Activities

A second focus point is a crack-down on unethical and illegal behaviours. The Council has noted an increase in attempts to defraud certificates, actions to lead applicants astray in their registration process and plagiarise assessment reports.

These activities fly in the face of the efforts made by the Registered Persons who work hard to keep

their registrations in good standing. They also erode the efforts made by the Council to secure and improve its operations, and we condemn any activity that attempts to defraud the registration process.

The Council investigates any irregular cases where fraudulent activity may be involved, and encourages incidents of suspected illicit behaviour to be reported to the SACPCMP via the contact details noted on the final page of this publication.

Frequently Asked Questions: The Interim CHS Qualifications Framework

Following the publication of the SACPCMP's interim qualification framework for Construction Health and Safety, many questions have been asked regarding 'the list' and what it entails for the CHS sector. The SACPCMP has consolidated the most frequently asked questions to provide some insight into the framework.

Question 1: What is an SACPCMP qualifications framework?

The qualifications framework lists the qualifications currently recognised by Council in all of its registration categories.

Question 2: What is the SACPCMP's CHS Interim qualifications framework?

This is an interim framework that lists the qualifications currently recognised by Council in CHS. It will be used for a limited period.

Question 3: Why does the SACPCMP have this framework?

The communication of the framework is part of a bigger initiative regarding imminent changes

taking place in CHS registration criteria – this is a mechanism being developed by the Council to close existing gaps in the recognition of qualifications for registration.

Further details regarding this will be communicated on this mechanism in the coming months, when the Council will make available guidelines and criteria for the recognition of educational qualifications, which will also outline the process of evaluating and recognising international qualifications for the purpose of registration.

Question 4: Why has the SACPCMP communicated this framework now?

As CHS industry practices and

regulations evolve and are updated, so too must the qualifications be updated.

The publication of the interim framework is part of a bigger initiative regarding imminent changes taking place in CHS registration criteria, which contribute to ensuring that professionals are up to date in their skills and education for the protection of the public and Built Environment at large.

Question 5: Is this the 'final list'?

No - over the next months, the Council will be reviewing CHS-related qualifications; thus, there could be a chance that qualifications that are not currently in the framework may be included in the future.



FAQs: The Interim CHS Qualifications Framework

Once the SACPCMP's full mechanism (see question and answer number 3) is put in place, the Council will provide reasonable timelines regarding registration cut-offs pertaining to qualifications that are not included in the FINAL framework.

Once this period is over no qualifications outside the approved qualification framework will be allowed for new registrations.

In addition, all Registered Persons whose qualifications do not meet final policy criteria, will be required to do intensive special CPD, during this period, to raise their level of educational achievement, failing which, they may be deregistered.

Question 6: Does the framework mean that the SACPCMP will not accept SAMTRAC or NEBOSH?

The SACPCMP has an INTERIM qualifications framework for CHS. Some of the qualifications that are queried do not currently appear on that framework.

However, applicants that apply with qualifications **that are not** on the interim framework will not be turned away for registration.



Their applications will be assessed and **BASED ON** their qualifications and experience (which differs from person to person), they may be recommended to complete additional CPD requirements as part of the conditions of their registration.

Question 7: Can I still register if I don't have the qualifications on the list?

For a period of time, applicants that apply with qualifications that are not on the interim framework will not be turned away from the registration process. Applications will be assessed and **BASED ON** qualifications and experience, so applicants may be recommended to complete additional requirements.

Once the SACPCMP's full mechanism (see question & answer number 3) is put in place, the Council will provide reasonable timelines regarding registration cut-offs pertaining to qualifications that are not included in the FINAL framework.

Question 8: Will other qualifications be accepted for registration?

Over the next months, the Council will be reviewing CHS-related qualifications; so there could be a chance that qualifications that are not currently in the framework **MAY** be included in the future.

But this will only occur if the qualifications meet the necessary and relevant criteria prescribed by

national laws, policies and the Council's accreditation policy for underlying qualifications.

Question 9: Why are THESE qualifications on the list?

All qualifications that are recognised by the SACPCMP for the purpose of registration must be Accredited by the Council of Higher Education (CHE) or Accredited by the Quality Council for Trades and Occupations (QCTO) AND be registered with the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA).

This interim list of qualifications fulfils ALL of these requirements. As such, the list forms the collection of qualifications that are recognised for the INTERIM for the purposes of registration in Construction Health and Safety (CHS) categories.

Question 10: Will I lose my registration if I don't have the qualifications indicated on the interim list?

All Registered Persons (RPs) whose qualifications do not meet final policy criteria will be required to do intensive special CPD, during a specific period, to raise their level of educational achievement, failing which, they may be deregistered.

Details of this will be communicated in good time so that RPs can undertake the necessary (additional) CPD.

Question 11: What is the 'June deadline' people are talking about?

There are NO hard and fast deadlines that have been confirmed by the Council to date. The June deadline refers to internal project planning regarding the Council's qualification mechanism (see question & answer number 3) but is not applicable at this stage to any applicants in the registration process.

Question 12: Some qualifications are registered with SAQA. Why does the SACPCMP not recognise these?

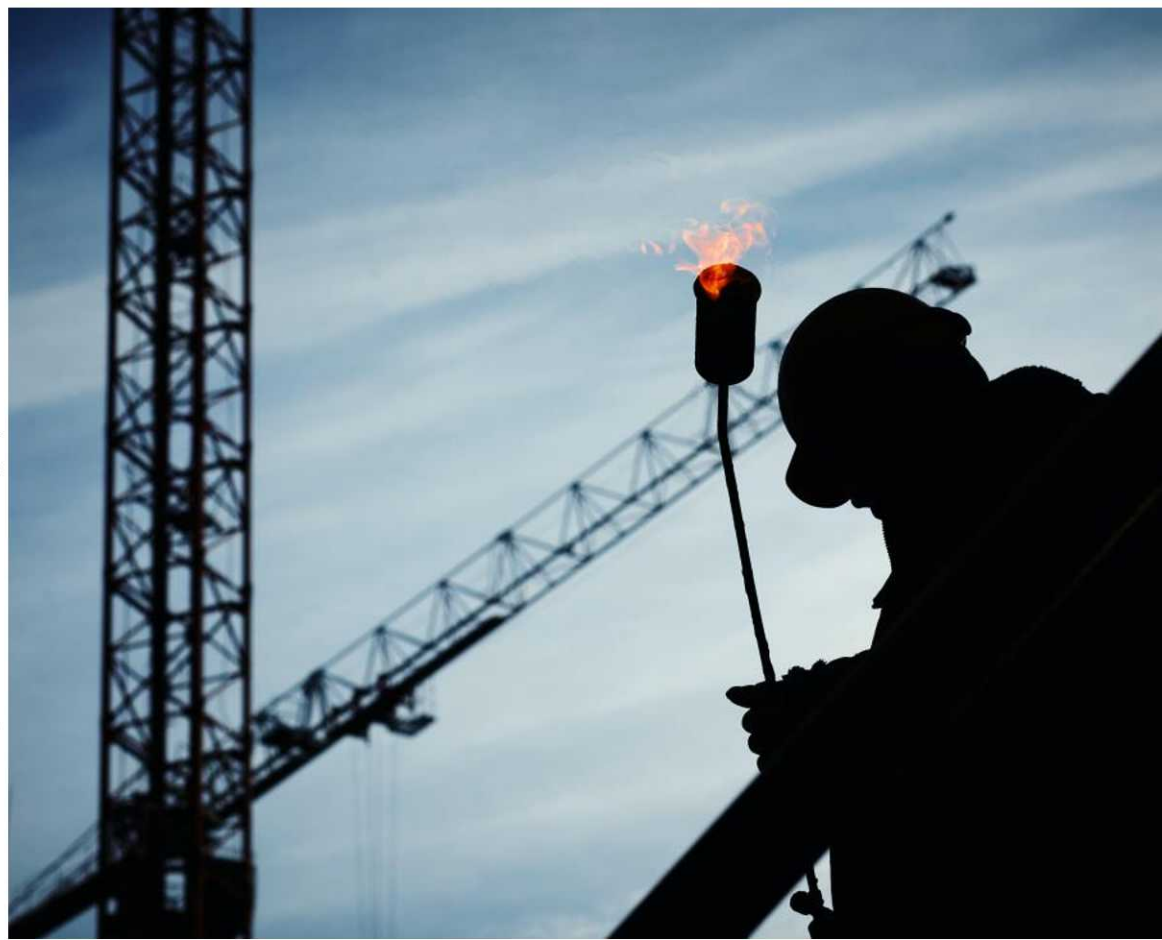
The Council's guideline for recognised qualifications is that they are accredited by the Council of Higher Education (CHE) or the Quality Council for Trades and

Occupations (QCTO) AND registered with the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA). The SACPCMP does not recognise short-courses or part qualifications as underlying qualifications for its designations.

Question 13: How does the SACPCMP select the qualifications on the framework?

The Council has a formal process in place where institutions of higher learning (universities and colleges) can apply to have their courses or qualifications accredited.

All qualifications that are subjected to the accreditation process must also be accredited by the Council of Higher Education (CHE) or the Quality Council for Trades and Occupations (QCTO) AND registered with the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA).

Certificates* have a unique QR code which links directly to the SACPCMP's online validation system. The Council for the Built Environment (CBE) has adopted a collaborative stance with the Councils for the Built Environment Professions (CBEP) to engage with the Competition Commission (CC) towards identifying the scope of work for the categories of Registered Persons.

This edition of Shape Shifter brings you a status update on progress in terms of the Identification of Work (IDoW) process.

Overview


The CBE and the Councils for the Built Environment follow the provisions of the Council for the Built Environment Act (No 43 of 2000) (The CBE Act) and the profession's Acts respectively.

Consultation with the Competition Commission is the remaining step required in terms of section 20(2) of the CBE Act. The purpose of this is to *identify the scope of work for every category of Registered Persons*.

Hierarchy of Events in the IDoW Process

There are essentially three levels (or three

key documents) within this Hierarchy of Events that must be in place:

Level 1

The core task is to identify the Scope of Work for each category of registration. In fact, everything else in the IDoW process (including the regulation of the entire Built Environment) relies on the establishment of this single, most important document (primarily the responsibility of the CBE, developed and published in 2019).

Level 2

There must be an overarching IDoW Policy to provide high-level principles, and to guide the six CBEP in drafting their respective IDoW Rules/Regulations. This



policy also ensures uniform application of standards amongst the six CBEP (primarily the responsibility of the CBE, compiled and approved in 2020).

Level 3

There should be a set of IDoW rules/regulations to ensure that the IDoW is implemented and operationalised on the ground.

The same must also be incorporated into the other concurrent

functions of the CBEP (primarily the responsibility of the six CBEP).

Those CBEP not at this level, at this point, must draw on what CBE has done to compile their respective IDoW Rules/Regulations.

The CBE has developed the following IDoW Work Plan to assist the CBEP in developing their respective IDoW Rules/Regulations:

Accidents, Fatalities & Injuries

In 2009, the Construction Industry Development Board (CIDB) industry report *Construction Health & Safety Status & Recommendations* highlighted the significant number of accidents, fatalities, and other injuries prevalent in the construction industry.

This was attributed to a lack of compliance with health and safety legislative requirements, indicative of a deficiency in effective management and supervision of health and safety on construction sites, a lack of sufficiently experienced and knowledgeable persons to manage health and safety during projects, as well as a lack in advance planning from the inception/conception within the context of construction project management.

SACPCMP Mandate

The Council for the Built Environment (CBE) mandated the SACPCMP in terms of Act No.48 to register construction health and safety professionals following the

The development of educational programmes and studies to support the professionals working or entering the Built Environment is a focus area of the SACPCMP in supporting the entity’s mandates.

Thus, the Council is proud of its association with the Nelson Mandela University as the institute on higher learning announced in late 2020 a new addition in construction health and safety studies. The opportunity to work towards a Bachelor of Science Honours in Construction Safe-

ty Management aims to equip students with advanced knowledge in the discipline of construction health and safety management (while the programme is yet to be accredited by the SACPCMP, it was approved in principle in 2014 through a Council endorsement).

“It is envisaged that a graduate will be able to apply the skills, knowledge, and values gained during their studies, within a business or project environment using an encompassing political,

cidb's report, which highlighted the need for professional registration of construction health and safety practitioners due to the finding that there was a lack of competencies, and no formal registration process.

This in turn led to the identification of three categories of registration, namely:

- **Professional Construction Health and Safety Agent (PrCHSA),**
- **Construction Health and Safety Manager (CHSM), and**
- **Construction Health and Safety Officer (CHSO).**

Registration rules were gazetted for these categories for commencement 2013 (however, to date, no NQF Level 8 construction health and safety qualification has existed).

Smallwood stated that overall, the purpose of the BSc Hon in Construction Health and Safety Management was to develop the necessary knowledge, understanding, and skills required to practice as a CHSA, and become a CHSM; graduates would be able to practice as CHSOs by default.

Qualification Access

Candidates shall be admitted to study for this postgraduate qualification only if:

- They hold the qualification Bachelor of Science in Construction Studies or a qualification deemed by the Senate to be equivalent thereto, or

- Hold a Bachelor qualification in one of the built environment or engineering disciplines, or
- if they otherwise qualify for admission in the opinion of Senate.

Candidates may be required to undertake a selection procedure. If deemed necessary, candidates may be required to complete certain prescribed supplementary modules prior to commencing with the qualification.

The widening of access to higher education will be promoted by considering candidates with Bachelor's degrees from related fields of study.

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)

Applicants who do not meet the direct admission requirements will be required to demonstrate that they have a qualification, plus suitable experiential, or work-based learning, which has taken the applicant to the equivalent of the entry level of the qualification specified above.

Such candidates may be considered for admission through RPL after assessment via a portfolio of evidence, which indicates that the prior learning has been done.

Applicants deemed to have sufficient potential, but are in need of

further academic development, may be required to broaden their curriculum by enrolling for preliminary modules.

This would be expedited according to the Nelson Mandela University RPL Policy.

The modules associated with the programme are:

- Construction Health and Safety Management 4A and 4B (30 Credits)
- Construction Environmental Management 4 (10 Credits)
- Construction Risk Management 4 (10 Credits)
- Design Management 4 (10 Credits)

Part-time courses offered in Construction Economics and Management

The School of Construction Economics and Management, from the University of the Witwatersrand (WITS) recently announced that it offers credit-bearing, part-time courses towards its SACPCMP accredited BSc Honours Degree in Construction Management.

This model was introduced to address an industry need where graduates in the Built Environment sector were unable to complete honours level study previously, or who undertook BTech qualifications and found it difficult to achieve professional registration with the SACPCMP due to the lack of a level 8 HEFQ qualification. It follows a successful model that has been introduced to enable the SACQSP accredited Honours degree in Quantity Surveying.

These courses are also available for those who want to register for personal/professional development and who meet the relevant entrance requirements.

How does it work?

The School of Construction Economics at WITS University, in partnership with Wits Plus (the centre for part-time studies) runs a number of short courses that are credit bearing towards the Honours degree. Students who complete any of these courses will receive a fully accredited WITS Certificate of Competence for that course. In order to make the course accessi-



ble and affordable for part-time student who may have to travel to WITS from other centres, the courses are offered over weekends.

These weekends are approximately four weeks apart with lectures taking place on Saturdays and Sundays. Students attending these courses will sit for the same exam and undertake the same assessments as the full-time students and in many cases the courses are taught by the same lecturing staff within the school.

To note...

Admissions to the Honours programme will be dependant on academic performance in these short courses. Successful completion of these courses do NOT guarantee acceptance into Honours. All students will be required to register for the Research and Professional Skills course,

completion of which is a prerequisite for admissions to the Honours programme.

The model allows for students to complete the Honours degree in a minimum period of two years. However, students will be able to spread the short course over a longer period.

Each weekend session will typically be a full Saturday but will finish at midday on Sunday.

A further three courses need to be completed in order to be awarded an Honours degree (Advanced Building Science, Simulated Project (CM) and the research report). These courses will not be available as short courses and will be registered as part of the Honours degree but are also taught using weekend contact session (and thus can only be done in 2021).

The remaining three courses must

be completed whilst a student is registered on the full-time Honours degree; thus, students who are permanent South African residents (or non-SA nationals) will need to apply for study permits as if this was a full-time programme. While the Honours degree is accredited by the SACPCMP, this does not guarantee that applicants will meet all the requirements for registration on completion of the Honours degree.
